REMEMBER WHAT TO BRING:

- Cutting supplies (mat for trimming/squaring up, rulers and rotary cutters)
- Neutral thread (think black, gray, beige/white)

Only a very few of you are actually members of our website at <u>WWW.HHQG.CA</u> so why not pay our website a visit and ask to join. It has general information about us as well as a private "Members Only" area where all of our Executive meeting minutes, monthly meeting minutes, newsletters and more are stored.

Creative Bug Database:

Thanks to Margot from Halton Hills Public Library who introduced us (back in June) to Creative Bug database available through the Halton Hills Library's website.

I highly recommend this website; it is so much fun – some of the presenters get pretty quirky but are fun to watch.

Creative Bug is available through Halton Hills Library (you will need a Halton Hills Library card), Brampton Library (using their card), and Caledon Libraries (using their card).

If you don't have a card from these libraries, you may be eligible to get a card from them regardless of where you live – give them a call to verify. (I wasn't able to find any links on the web sites for Milton, Mississauga or Rockwood)

To sign up through the Halton Hills Library (HHPL); go to hhpl.ca>Learn > Creativity Centre >Creative Bug; create an account using your HHPL library card and PIN number

Once you have created an account, you can go straight to the website creativebug.com and log in directly from there.

I have been "exploring" the web site since the spring and there are many areas of interest to me. Obviously the most important one for guild members would be the quilting!!

There are over 100 "workshops" under the quilting tab, ranging from basic patchwork techniques to English paper piecing; colour theory and ruler work for domestic machines. There are daily quilting challenges (ie: a block a day), at least 4 Kaffe Fassett quilt projects; as well as some fabric painting projects with added free motion quilting.

There are many other topics besides quilting: sewing, knitting, crochet, painting etc. – all lots of fun to watch. Videos range from a few minutes to a couple of hours. You can keep track of which workshops you've watched so you can refer back to them whenever you want.

I actually (to my great surprise) finished a 30-day Chicken Scratch project – which I showed at the Oct guild meeting.

Try it – you may like it!!

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Quilting Terminology...from Anne Balanyk

Borders: Strips of fabric that frame the edges of the quilt. You can have one or many borders in a quilt top. You may also have borders surrounding your quilt blocks, also known as sashing, or as part of quilt block design.

Cake Layers: Fabric that is cut into 10" squares. These can be bought pre- packaged in many quilt stores.

Chain Piecing: This technique is used when sewing many quilt pieces that are identical. Example: sewing several 2-inch squares together. Feed these pieces through your machine, right sides together, sewing consecutively without cutting the thread, also called Fast Feed. Cut the thread after all units have been sewn together.

Charm Pack: A variety of a fabric line cut into 5" squares. Charm packs are sold in many quilt shops, and are packaged by numerous fabric retailers. Number in bundles can vary among manufacturers.

Corner Square: A square that is sewn to the ends of the top and bottom borders before added to a quilt. Side borders will be sewn to the quilt first.

Corner Triangle: The triangles set in the corners of a quilt that is set on "Point." These are half square triangles, meaning the straight of grain is on the outer edges of the triangle.

Cornerstones: A name given to the small blocks that join sashing strips together surrounding a block or blocks in a quilt top.

Crosswise Grain: The threads of woven fabric that run perpendicular to the selvage.

Echo Quilting: Echo or Shadow quilting is a technique where quilting is done around an outline of an applique piece on a quilt top or around a design or pattern. Then the quilting is echoed again and again around the previously stitched line. Continue to do this until block is filled or desired effect is achieved.

Fat Eighth: A typical 1/8 yard of fabric is 4 ½" x 42. A fat eight is 9" x 21". It produces a "fatter" square piece of fabric, providing more options for use.

Fat Quarter: A typical 1/4 yard of fabric is 9" x 44". A fat quarter is 18"x22." It produces a "fatter" square piece of fabric, providing more options for use.

Feed Dogs: Teeth like mechanisms that sits below the presser foot of a sewing machine and move fabric through the machine as you stitch. Feed dogs also help control stitch length. If you drop your feed dogs, you can achieve free motion quilting.

Finger Pressing: Walking your finger along a seam, pressing with your nail or tip of finger to crease it without use of iron.

Free Motion Quilting: A process requiring a free motion quilting, darning or hopping foot. Requires you to drop your feed dogs so you can move fabric freely in all directions. Special gloves marketed for free motion quilting can help in controlling the fabric by providing extra grip.

Foundation Piecing: A method used for joining together small pieces of fabric to form a more complicated pattern or design. It is done by sewing the small pieces of fabric onto a foundation paper or fabric.

President's Challenge 2023-2024



For this year's President's Challenge, I would like to challenge you to make a new piece. The piece should be something that sums up what speaks to you and brings you peace.

What speaks to you and brings you peace?

It doesn't have to be a 'thing', as long as, you can articulate it in fabric.

Workshop - Jane Symmes


My apologies for not being properly organized to hold a workshop this Fall.

SURVEY SAYS!!!: I have the updated members list, so you should see the survey coming out soon! Looking forward to hearing from you!


**DONATION RESOURCES:** I have sent out a new round of emails to organizations who would be interested in receiving our quilts, so hoping for an update there soon!!!

Everyone who has ever sewn has a tomato pincushion... our Grandmothers, mothers, aunts, literally everybody, and I wondered why.






seasonal, the ladies would create them from fabric and fill them with leaves and things from the outdoors.


